If you are 18 years or over and comply with residential qualifications can become a town councillor.

It is exciting times for local government with central government trying to instigate changes and sweep away the district council tier. Whatever may happen it looks as if town

councils will end up with more powers as it is recognised that they are the most democratic and economic level of government.

For the very first time 18 years olds can stand for a Councillor as the age has now gone down from 21 years to 18 years.

Nominations from the under 30 years age group would be very welcome, this includes young mothers who are also not represented on the present Council. A Town Council should reflect the cross section of the community in age and in gender.

Whatever your career/

intended career or ambitions, more emphasis is being placed on community and community involvement. Your ability to act as one of a democratic group working for the community may be useful experience. Ideally you need to be able to commit to the council for a four year term although it is recognised that this is not always possible.

The Daffodil Walk - Sat. 17th March

It is time to dust off your walking boots and prepare for the Annual Tamar Valley Daffodil Walk. This year's walk is by popular request reverting to one of our original routes, starting at Calstock Village Hall and following a route through the ancient Daffodil fields of the Tamar Valley.

The walk is organised and marshalled by the Lions Club of Callington to allow organisations to "Raise money for your own funds". The only proviso is that your organisation is bona fide and recognised as non profit making. Alternatively walk for Callington Lions.

Sponsorship forms are available from Callington Town Hall and the entrance fee is £1.50 for adults, 75p for under 16yrs.

The walk will start and finish at Calstock Village Hall, which will also be the control centre.

The routes are ONE, FIVE and TEN miles. The route will consist mostly of public footpaths, some of it muddy, so suitable stout footwear or wellies should be worn. A responsible adult should accompany children at all times. The route will be marked, and marshals available at appropriate points. Please remember to observe the Country Code.



Callington and Traffic

The Town Plan brought forward issues that you wanted solved. One of the main problems was with traffic and the town centre. The Town Council have had to employ a consultant to investigate traffic management as the County Council Highways department were unwilling to liaise directly with us.

At the time of writing we have not received the full report from Cornwall County Council [CCC], but we have received a summary from our consultants.

The County Council have taken the ideas the Town Plan put forward and looked at the feasibility of these.

They see the upgrading of Florence Road as an alternative by-pass route especially for heavy vehicles as a constructive idea. CCC would support the introduction of an advisory signing scheme. As advisory it would not be enforceable, however their discussions with Ginsters revealed that they would be happy to use that route up to the A30. It was noted that today's modern SatNav equipment would guide lorries through Callington and along the

A388 as it is. At the time of writing we are not sure if the scheme includes mini-roundabouts at both ends of Florence Road.

Total pedestrianisation of Fore Street is considered unacceptable. The effect on buses was the prime consideration here.

Partial pedestrianisation was considered in a number of different arrangements. This was always tempered by the need to maintain bus access. CCC considered that the use of interactive bollards triggered by the buses would successfully exclude cars from the pedestrianised areas. These are, however, expensive pieces of hardware. The traffic counts taken in June 2006 were used to estimate the effect on traffic flows on the surrounding streets due to the various sections of road being pedestrianised.

Within the pedestrianisation options, the question of making the western end of Fore Street one way was assessed with flows in either direction. If this happened it would allow a pedestrian crossing at the traffic lights. Such a scheme could be funded on the grounds of safety.

The impact of the various options that were investigated result in changes to the traffic flows around the Town Centre. They are indicated in the CCC report as either increase or decreases in percentage of the starting flows. In some locations, particularly the turning onto and off Back Lane are shown as additional vehicle movements.

There is no recommendation of a particular option within the report, it is really a listing of comparisons and their effects.

CCC have also instigated a Safety Scheme which is about to commence. This will commence soon and it is to provide footways on the east side of the A388 north of Callington Community College.

A possible source of funding has also been identified.

Once the report is received, and CCC give permission to make it public, any member of the public can view it. Please ask at the Town Council Office or if possible, it will be available on the web site.

Town Council Go For It!

As you may have gathered, the Town Council are always alert to any possibility of grant funding that may be to the advantage of the town and will, of course, help keep the demands on the rates down.

Since the Town Plan was published in 2005 we have been looking at ways of funding improvements to the town centre as this was one your highest priorities. We have regularly reported on the steps we have been taking which have been frustratingly slow. The traffic management study reported on page 3 is part of this process.

We have recently learnt about a source of funding that may help this town. The funding is from the National Lottery and comes from the same source as the £50,000 we received for the cemetery chapel. The fund is called the Townscape Heritage Initiative [THI]. It makes funding available for improvements to the historic fabric of the town and for public spaces. Private

property owners who need to make renovations to their buildings or enhance the historic characteristics of the older buildings can, through this scheme obtain 50% grants.

The total value of this application may be close to one million pounds. Like most applications there is a long process with a first stage application that has to be in by May of this year, but after a second stage application it is likely that if we were successful, activity on the ground would not start until early 2009.

The Town Council have decided to go for it! on the principle of nothing ventured, nothing gained. Whilst Launceston did this by employing someone at a cost of £5000 to submit the bid, your Council have decided to do this in-house. The Town Clerk will therefore be very busy throughout March putting together a first stage application.

Go Zero

As concern for the environment and the legacy that we will leave our children grows, many individual households, villages and even small towns are looking to reduce carbon emissions. This is being done by utilizing energy-saving home improvements. Have you converted to low energy bulbs? They really do work out cheaper in the long run.

Many communities world-wide are striving to achieve zero waste. Whilst in Caradon we still have a problem with some forms of plastic, there are many things you can recycle from mobile phones, to spectacles, to toner cartridges, etc.

The jute bag scheme has worked very well and we have now sold hundreds of these at the Town Hall. Each jute bag used can save up to 350 carrier

bags a year. It is great to see the people at the check-outs with jute bags, clearly refusing any additional packaging. Why do we have to have shampoo in an additional plastic bag? It's in a thick plastic container as it is!

What do we do about all those dreadful polystyrene trays that come with every piece of supermarket meat or fish? We could buy at the local shops, or perhaps we should package them all up and send them to No.10 Downing Street. After all the government complains about landfill but then pass regulations requiring food to be bundled up in layers of non degradable plastic.

However concern for the environment does mean you cannot look at one thing in isolation. Waste is not just about what you throw away, but about

what you buy and how you transport it. Its about why we buy things and who produces it.

We live in one of the most productive food growing parts of the country but often our food travels all the way up to a 'central' depot only to come back again to our local shops and supermarkets. Perhaps we should be asking the management more about the food they sell, where it comes from and how it gets there. Let's see more 'Local Produce' in our shops that has gone straight from the grower to the shop.

One way of supporting local producers is to buy at our local markets. In Callington we are fortunate to have a weekly Wednesday market and a fortnightly Friday one.

A Report From The Police!

Elizabeth Jane Cowling, aged 18, described as of no trade, was charged with stealing £12.10s, the property of Thomas Dawe, from his person, at Callington, on the 9th February. The prosecutor was a young miner, and on the day mentioned, he, having £12.10s in his purse in his inside jacket pocket, was at the Red Lion Inn, in Callington, drinking with the prisoner, and with other girls. After some conversation with the prisoner, they went to the house of Mrs Amelia Coke and then proceeded to an upstairs room. After they had been there some time, the prisoner was heard down below, by Amelia Coke. On her leaving the upstairs room, Dawe missed his £12.10s and going down the stairs he sent for the Inspector of police, Frederick Wreford. Wreford made search for the woman in Callington and Liskeard, but

could not succeed in finding her. She was however apprehended in Liskeard on the 17th of February. Verdict, Guilty - Six Months Hard Labour.

Matthew Kitto, an old man, was charged with having stolen a silver teaspoon, the property of Rev. J J Tapson, the prosecutor who resided in Callington. In December last he missed a silver teaspoon. On the 2nd of February, the prisoner sold a spoon at the shop of Mr Budge, a silversmith in Callington, which was much beaten and bent, stating that he had found it in some pig's dirt. On seeing it the prosecutor at once identified it by the cipher, as the one which he had lost. Verdict - Guilty. Four months Hard Labour.

Searching for Wartime Hosts

Livio Gambone was an Italian prisoner of war who was captured in North Africa and then shipped to Liverpool where he was put on a train to Callington. Initially he was placed in a camp in the town but was then billeted on a farm some distance from town (perhaps half an hour's walk away). He stayed on the farm throughout the rest of his stay in the UK and was involved in agricultural work for the farm growing vegetables and then visiting local town markets to sell them.

He very much enjoyed his time on the farm and he and his family are trying to find the farming family who looked after him firstly to say thank you and secondly to renew their friendship.

Livio now lives with his Italian wife in Guelph which is close to Toronto in Canada. One of his grand daughters now lives in Gisburn in Lancashire and is married to my son.
