Police on the beat in Callington

In October the Town Council took two decisions relating to the safety of all residents. First they decided to approve a recommendation for a CCTV scheme in Fore Street. This would be subject to £34,000 being obtained through grant funding to pay for the initial equipment.

Applications have been made for this funding and it is now a case of keeping fingers crossed. Once installed there will be an annual maintenance cost of £2000. The other decision was to pay for additional police hours to ensure adequate police coverage on the streets of the town at certain times.

Whilst no one, least of all Councillors like to have to pay twice to ensure we get the police service we are already paying for through County Council rates, the Town Council felt that they were left with no alternative and that we had to have a trial to see whether it would

provide value for money. Additional police coverage was provided on Christmas Eve and New Years Eve as part of the standard service, but the Town Council paid, out of reserves, for an officer to be present at other key periods throughout

December. This officer was accompanied by another that the town did not have to pay for.

At a special meeting in January to review this trial, Councillors and the local police were pleased with the results. There had been two arrests for disorderly conduct, several incidents were broken up before they escalated and alcohol was taken from under age drinkers.

Portreeve, Cllr Winfindale said, "It seems to have worked and it has clearly given the message that disorderly conduct will not be tolerated on the streets of Callington". Councillors are now working with local police to identify other key times when additional police cover will be requested.

Motoring Matters

Since this column started, 6 months ago, a variety of matters have been reviewed including parking, tyres, internal clutter and window condition, speeding, maintenance and safety to mention a few. So to start the New Year why not resolve to improve our standard of driving – we all can since there is no such person as the perfect driver. Some drivers are good, most are average but regrettably a few are bad or even dangerous. But of course none of our readers are in the latter category, are you? Enough of that since this month there are a variety of matters to report and the first concerns parking. This continues to be a problem in Callington (not helped by excessive parking charges) particularly by the pedestrian crossing in

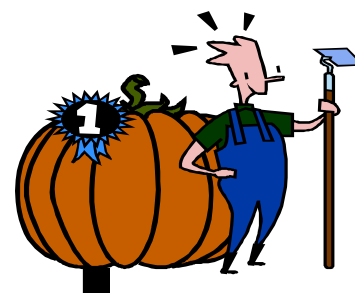
Fore Street. Parking is NOT ALLOWED either on the crossing or in the area of the zig-zag lines even "only for a couple of minutes". The safety reasons are quite obvious and there are quite severe penalties if caught. It appears that the Ambulance crews are very concerned at the increasing number of deaths and severe injuries caused by people not wearing their seat belts. So remember to BELT UP, it might save your life. Quite a number of drivers are still using hand held mobile phones while driving. DON'T, you need all your concentration while driving. Another safety point, do try not to reverse out of a driveway on to a busy or main road. It is much better to reverse in and to see the traffic properly

as you drive out. When exiting a roundabout it is unwise to attempt to pass the vehicle in front. It will be accelerating away as well perhaps more briskly than you think so wait for conditions to settle before attempting to overtake. Lastly, a point of interest about "jumping the red" at traffic lights. Apparently in Plymouth there is an increase in the number of drivers committing this offence. In addition to being very dangerous the consequences can be very severe, £1,000 plus 3 points on your licence. In Plymouth and elsewhere automatic monitoring cameras are installed at many locations, so don't be tempted. In conclusion if you have any comments about motoring just drop a line to the editor.

News from the Town Council

The Town Council continues to take actions on the items brought forward in the Town Plan. Further to a meeting called by the Town Council we are pleased to say that a steering group of young people has been formed to put together a project to meet the needs of the youngsters in the town. As you will see from the front page the security of everyone in the town is an issue the Council have been addressing. It is also encouraging to see the community themselves taking steps to improve their

neighbourhood. If anyone else wants to set up Neighbourhood Watch areas do make contact.

The Town Council is promoting activities to attract people into town on Saturday mornings. We are holding table-top sales in the town hall on a monthly basis, initially as a trial. Tables are only £5 each and applications are welcome from anyone clearing out their garage/loft, to groups, businesses, charities, etc. There should be plenty for everyone, so do call in.

Film Shows continue, our apologies with the hiccup in January that necessitated us cancelling the January showing. February will

Policeman Beaten Up in Callington Pub

Before the court were Matthew Northey, 22, Josiah Northey, 24, William Snell, 24, charged with having violently assaulted and beaten Immer Burt, a constable of Callington, in the execution of his duty.

Immer Burt, on the 25th of September, Callington Fair Day, was called between eleven and twelve o'clock at night, to the Red Lion, kept by Mr. Henwood, and found the three prisoners and other men in a very disorderly state. They were miners. Witness

required the peace, said he was a constable, and showed his staff. He ordered them to leave the house. Mr. Henwood's son pointed out Matthew Northey as the principal offender. Matthew Northey said "I don't care for all the constables that come; we'll beat the whole." He struck witness with his fist. Witness fell, and Northey upon him. Witness's staff was taken from him, and he afterwards saw it in Matthew Northey's hand. Two or three beat witness on the ground. Witness lay a-bed seven days, and

a doctor attended him. Witness saw Matthew Northey with Burt's staff in his hand. He endeavoured also to take witness's staff, but did not succeed. Mr. John addressed the jury for the prisoners, and called as witnesses to character, Mr. John Pascoe, of Holmbush, Capt. Joseph Oats, and Mr. Longmaid, of Truro. Verdict, Guilty against all the prisoners. Matthew, four months' hard labour; and Josian and Snell, two months' hard labour.

Sexual Assault by Callington Roadside

Recently before the courts at Callington Petty Sessions was William Lucas, 26, charged on oath with having violently and feloniously assaulted Mary Reed, on the public highway near Callington, with an intent to violate her person. He further stands charged with a felony, of stealing

an umbrella, the property of the above named Mary Reed. He was found guilty on both indictments; on the first charge, to be imprisoned for fourteen days; on the second charge, to be transported for seven years.

More Drunkenness & Disorder in Town

Callington Petty Sessions - At these Sessions, on Thursday, William Jasper, of Callington, was fined 10s. and costs for furious driving at St. Mellion. - Thomas Webb, of the Caradon Hotel, for permitting drunkenness on his premises was fined £5, and had his licence endorsed. - Thirza Miles, of Callington, for damaging a door, in Back-lane, a fine of 1s. and costs was inflicted. - Thomas Verran of Callington was fined 15s. and costs for being drunk in licensed

premises, there were four previous convictions. - John Mortimore was fined 5s. and costs for being drunk on the highway.

West Briton 7 Mar. 1887

Another Public House in Callington

John Wenmouth appealed against the decision of the Magistrates to not grant him a licence for a public house in Callington.

Witness was well acquainted with Callington. There were about 1,500 inhabitants, and eight public-houses. Wenmouth keeps a beer-shop at the north part of the town. It was capable of affording good accommodation; and there was a house adjoining which might be

made into a stable. There was a large weekly market at Callington – four fairs in the year – a cattle-market every month, when there was no fair, and an agricultural meeting once a year. Witness believed another public-house would be a great accommodation, and had heard people complain of want of accommodation in stabling. By Mr. Lyne – "There are three beer-shops, besides the eight

public-houses. In the part of the town where Wenmouth lived, there were three public-houses within a short distance." Mr. Lyne admitted the fitness of the applicant; but only questioned whether there was a necessity for a public-house. The Bench granted the licence.

ACCIDENT. On Wednesday week, a woman called Elizabeth Harris, fell out of the upper door of her woodhouse at Callington, and was so much injured that she died on the following day. An inquest was held on the body on Friday last, and a verdict returned of "accidental death".

18 Jan. 1850

CALLINGTON POLICE. On the 26th ultimo, before Mr Fletcher, Richard Osborn a miner, was brought up in custody from St Just in Penwith, under warrant, charged with leaving his family of six children chargeable to the parish. The charge being fully proven he was committed to Bodmin gaol for two months with hard labour.

6th Feb. 1850

CALLINGTON POLICE. 23rd Feb. Jane Quick a married woman whose husband is in America, but from whom she recently received a remittance of £20 was charged with deserting her family of 6 children now in Union House Liskeard [*the Workhouse*] but charged to the parish. Committed to Bodmin gaol for 14 days.
