£50,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund

The Town Council are very pleased to have secured a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund for nearly £50,000. A large percentage of this is for work to the cemetery chapel. Although it needs close inspection to detect it, some stone work is in a dangerous condition and the entire building needs repointing due to the ingress of water creating damp. The grant has obviously saved this cost going on the rates.

However in order to get the money for the above building work a project had to be put together to demonstrate an attempt to increase awareness of the local heritage.

The Town Council has worked closely with the Museum Trustees and the projected work will include a complete revamp of the Museum and its displays, the porch area will be enclosed with doors to increase the display area and access for the disabled

will be easier.

In the Town Survey you said the Museum wanted "kicking into the 21st Century" and that we should "make more of the local heritage". Well, we will do just that. The cataloguing of everything at the Museum will be

completed so everyone will know just what is there, this ultimately may be available on a country wide web based database. Publications are planned with a Heritage Trail for the town and Heritage Walks which will be published within a few months. Some Education Packs and boxes will come after that. More data will go on the web site.

This season will be an exciting one for the Museum, if you would like to help please contact the Town Council in the first instance. More wardens are always welcomed for the Museum which opens Friday to Sunday 1000-1600hrs from Easter. It is also open Bank Holiday Mondays.

Youngsters Don't Want a Youth Café ?

In the Town Survey it was quite clear that adults thought the youngsters should have more facilities in Callington and 88% of the youth themselves just wanted an informal indoor location to meet their friends.

In November the Town Forum and Town Council held a meeting, this was widely advertised in the News and letters were sent to many organizations as well as posters being displayed. At present there is grant funding available for youth projects exceeding £100,000 per grant, but a key aspect of this is that

the youth themselves must be actively involved in the project and making the application. Youth in Tavistock have recently done just this and have opened their own youth café run by a management team that is largely under 25 years.

From the November meeting another meeting was held to form a youth committee, again posters were well distributed at the Community College as well as in the town. This first meeting was well attended, but the second meeting to formalize the constitution of the group and open bank accounts

was attended by just one person!

This is a great shame as there are many people prepared to help the youngsters, the Town Council, the Town Forum and the Lions to name but a few. However nothing can be done without the young people themselves. **There is one last chance**—if you want something done and are under 25 years old there will be a meeting in March. Please watch out for notices at the Community College and on notice boards in the town and on the Town Hall.

A Jacket Made Out of Plastic Bottles?

Every other Wednesday morning reveals just how many people are making the effort to recycle as an increasing number of blue, white and red bags can be seen out for collection.

One of the greatest frustrations is the amount of plastic that cannot be recycled at present. 11% of household waste is plastic, 40% of which is plastic bottles. The problem with plastic is that there is so many different types, however bottles [fizzy drink,

squash, milk & detergent] are made from three main types and can be recycled. Bottles should be washed and squashed—it costs a lot of money to transport

air!
Place them in the clear recycling bags. At present only 5.5% of bottles sold are recycled. About 9.1 billion bottles are thrown away each and go in land fill sites. These take an average of

500 years to decompose! Recycling just one plastic bottle saves enough energy to power a 60W light bulb for 6 hours!.

All sorts of amazing products can be made from recycled bottles, bin liners, carrier bags, pipes, CD & DVD covers, water butts, seed trays, fibre filling and even fleece jackets.

Remember, make the effort for the sake of the world we live in and the world your children and children's children will inhabit!

Motoring Matters

This column could be accused of always carping on about bad habits, but there are really only two broad subjects to consider. These are bad or dangerous behaviour and survival techniques and they apply to all classes of road users, not just car drivers! Pedestrians, users of bicycles, mopeds, wheelchairs, cars, vans and HGV's each need to be aware of the needs of all the others, not just because of the law but for common courtesy and safety.

Now for the hardy annual subject – PARKING! Yet again charges are continuing their upward spiral and from April 3rd it is likely we shall have to pay 50p for ½ an hour. It would be helpful if Caradon D.C. would follow the example of Kerrier D.C. and reduce the charges, but that would be too much to hope for. These charges

(another stealth tax) discourage visitors to Callington and the economic growth of local business. They are also largely responsible for the illegal and dangerous parking on the roads within the town centre. Need we say more.

Some interesting statistics have come to hand and a few are worth considering. They are:-

In England and Wales approx £20 million per annum in fixed penalties goes to the Treasury.

In 2003 there were 1.78 million camera detected speeding offences which was 93% of the total.

In 2003 there were 125,000 cameras detecting traffic light offences.

Now for a few driving tips (reminders) for vehicle drivers as we all go about our daily business:-

Watch for drivers who brake without thinking when they see a speed camera regardless of what is behind them.

Allow at least a 2 second gap between you and the vehicle in front, more if the road is wet, a lot more if ice is about.

Try not to turn the steering wheel when the vehicle is stationary particularly if it has power steering.

Check tyre pressures and road lights at least every week and before a long journey.

Lastly, use your seatbelt not your mobile phone.

News from the Town Council

As you will have seen we have good news from the Heritage Lottery Fund. This grant application took a full year to put together and get a result. Other applications are in the pipeline. Two grant bids for £27,000 have just gone in for CCTV, this is at the end of a two year period of investigations and consultations. There is another grant application in the pipeline for the equipment for the film shows which continue to be held in the Town Hall once a month. The Town Council is also working with the Community College to put together an application for new play equipment at Launceston Road. As the

source of funding is mainly the lottery, all successful applications save you, the ratepayer, money.

The Town Hall Committee have decided to start the process that will lead to better access to the various rooms in the Town Hall, especially for the disabled. Although there will first be consultations, drawings, specifications, etc. to be compiled it is again hoped that the bulk of the money needed for this will come from grants.

Height limitation barriers have been erected at Saltash Road car park due to the increasing number of heavy

vehicles using the car park. When the car park was originally constructed its specification was for use by private cars and continued use by large vehicles will lead to early degradation of the surface. Our own workforce did the work themselves to keep costs to a minimum.

The Town Council have strongly opposed the increase in car park charges made by Caradon District Council, but to no avail. However Callington is one of the few towns in the area where a FREE car park is provided. You can always register your disapproval of these rises by using, where practical, your free car park in Saltash Road.

1000 year old bodies at South Hill

A few years ago when there were some drainage and repair works at St Sampsons church, South Hill the Cornwall Archaeological Unit team took the opportunity (paid for by English Heritage) to do some excavations around the perimeter of the church. St Sampson's is the mother church of the combined parish of Callington and South Hill. The church as it can be seen today dates from the first half of the 14th century but it is believed to have been built on an existing Norman church.

During the excavations the buried remains of 21 individuals were

found. Several of these were in cist graves, these are small pits constructed from upright slate slabs with slate capstones. These types of grave are only found in Cornwall, Wales, Ireland and Scotland.

Carbon dating has now given dates for the burials of between 1010 and 1280AD. Although very little can be said about these people, they almost certainly lived in small family groups and farmed the land. Compared to us they would have been short and their skeletons showed signs of tooth problems and malnutrition. The excavations also proved the existence of the original Norman church.

It can now be said with certainty that almost 1000 years ago, around the time of the Norman conquest there was an active community in and around South Hill. Whilst the hills and valleys they looked out upon were the same as we still see, the scenery and the world in which they lived was far removed from that we experience today.

Tunnels Under the Town

Recently, during excavations in Fore Street adjacent to Kelly's, the town's underground tunnel was revealed. This top of this tunnel is about three feet down and is high enough for a person to walk in. There are numerous rumours about where it goes to and from, when and why it was built. One end of it has been unearthed during the renovation work at the Old Clink Inn and it is said to run from here to the Church. From what could be seen it clearly runs along from the Old Clink along the centre of the road and then it veers towards St Mary's Close. Prior to 1970 there were shops on what is now St

Mary's Close and these all had cellars, but no one can recall any stories about tunnels going through the cellars. The Old Clink Inn was at one time home to the Petty Session Court and a large cell has been revealed beneath the floor. The new landlord is planning to make a feature of this. No steps have been found to this cell so the prisoners may have literally been dropped in. The sealed up entrance to the tunnel is clearly visible in this cell as is an entrance to a tunnel that would have gone to the adjacent shop. The Old Clink lock-up by the church only dates from the 1850's and the tunnel is believed to be much older than this, does it run under or

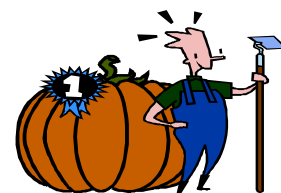
beside the lock-up to the church? Some say a tunnel went from the church to the Bull's Head, but is there any factual confirmation of this? The rumours that it was a smugglers route are unlikely to say the least. All we can say for certain is that a tunnel can be found at the Old Clink Inn which goes into the road, runs along under Fore Street and probably turns across in front of Kelly's. It is highly likely that it went to the church, but there is no proof of this—unless anyone knows anything to the contrary. Do we have an older residents who have actually been in the tunnel?

Grow Your Own Vegetables

There is nothing like growing your own vegetables, you know where they have come from and what has, or more importantly, has not gone on them. You also can get some fresh air and exercise at the same time.

March is the beginning of spring but do not be in too much of a hurry to plant, early seeds can rot or be retarded if planted too early. Concentrate on getting the soil finely cultivated. You can warm up the soil by covering with fleeces or old carpet or you can plant your early seeds under cloches.

As soon as the weather improves you can sow Broad Bean, Broccoli (early sprouting), Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, early Carrots, summer Lettuce, maincrop Onion seed, Spring Onions, Peas (early) and summer Radish. You can also plant maincrop Onion sets if you haven't already done this, new potatoes can be planted and maincrop potatoes from the 15th onwards. Potatoes can be sprouted in trays kept in a cool frost free location from the start of the month. Once planted out they must be earthed up until all frost has gone.



Of course, do not forget about buying your pumpkin seed for the Callington Grand Pumpkin Challenge! However the books suggest you should not plant these until about mid-April, so more information next month.

Anyone wanting an allotment should visit the Town Hall and put their name on the waiting list, you may have to wait a few months, but a wait of a year is rare.

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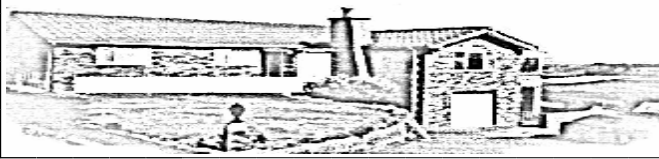
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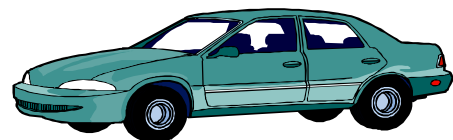
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
