Callington now Twinned with Barsbüttel

Signed, sealed, delivered forty-three brave pioneers led the way on Callington's first twinning visit to our new twin town of Barsbüttel in Northern Germany. Our visit coincided with Barsbüttel's celebrations for the 777th anniversary of the town's charter so there was plenty of fun and activities built into our programme. After an initial introduction to the town and a guided visit to the other three communities which together form the area covered by their town council we were taken on an excellent tour of Hamburg, much of it well off the usual well-beaten

tourist trail.

Various entertainments were laid on in which the Callington contingent participated. The penultimate function was the official signing of the twinning charters on German soil when Portreeve Denise Winfindale and Twinning Association chairman Sue Lumley represented the town of Callington in the presence of Dagmar Henning, Chairman of the Barsbüttel Twinning Association, Amo Kowalski, Mayor of Barsbüttel, and the British Consul General for Hamburg. Cornish voices were flexed in a hearty

rendition of "Trelawney" to mark the occasion in true Cornish spirit.

The final event was the celebratory meal held in the secondary school. A German buffet weighed down the long tables, and good humour and *Gemutlichkeit* were the order of the day. There have been many occasions in the past when friends from Callington and Barsbüttel have met up, but there can scarcely have been a time when the atmosphere was so warm and convivial. It certainly bodes well for the future of twinning between the two towns.

Bob – I'm back

Well, I made it back from Russia in one piece. I have been asked to write a short account of the run but to try and condense 54 days into 500 words is impossible so I thought I would share with you some of the more obscure moments as well as some of the high and low points.

Driving down to the start through Portugal we heard a funny noise. We quickly realised something was wrong with our motorhome- the exhaust had snapped and broken off. As we sat there with the flies waiting for our pick-up vehicle it suddenly dawned on me: we might not even make it to the start, how good would that look!

It was a nightmare

running through any town or city. I always seemed to get lost and lose valuable time and energy. Going through the annoyingly busy city of Burgos I had managed to run on a motorway for a while before eventually climbing a barbed wire fence to get off it. Still lost though I found a man in the street to ask the way out of the city. Fluent in English he understood perfectly when I explained to him that I was running to Russia and needed to get out of Burgos. 'It's too dangerous', he explained. 'If you want to run go to this lovely park around the corner. After thanking him I thought no matter how nice a park it was running around it would get me no closer to Russia. (I

eventually found a way out)

Another time I got lost in a city I ended up in exactly the same place as I had been 1½ hours previously. Tired, hot and hugely frustrated I kicked the kerb with my already injured ankle. (not very bright)

In Eastern Europe I got such strange looks from passers by. I wondered if I had suddenly grown 2 heads. Thinking it through though it dawned on me that they have probably never seen someone going for a run. Their lives are so hard that everything they do is geared for surviving. The idea of running for fun would have seemed ludicrous.

Fireworks Legislation



◆ You can't set off fireworks between 11pm and 7am except for 5th November when you can set them off until midnight and New Year's Eve, Chinese New Year and Diwali when they can be set off until 1am.

◆ You must be over 18 to buy fireworks, except for

caps, cracker snaps, novelty matches, party poppers, serpents and throwdowns where the legal age of purchase is 16.

◆ It is an offence to throw or set off fireworks in a street or public place and it is also illegal for anyone under 18 to possess

fireworks in public.

◆ It is an offence for people who aren't firework professionals to buy and possess category 4 fireworks. These are only to be used at public displays by firework professionals.

Fireworks Safety for Children

◆ Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114.

◆ Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.

◆ Keep fireworks in a closed box.

◆ Follow the instructions on each firework.

◆ Light at arm's length, using a taper.

◆ Stand well back.

◆ Never go near a firework that has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode.

◆ Never put fireworks in

your pocket or throw them.

◆ Always supervise children around fireworks.

◆ Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.

◆ Never give sparklers to a child under five.

Fireworks and Pets

Although fireworks are fun for us, they are not fun for animals. Most animals get very scared by the lights and noise, so you should take precautions to protect your pets during the times of the year when fireworks are likely to be

set off. The animal charity <http://www.bluecross.org.uk> says that the best thing you can do is to keep your pets indoors. This includes bringing in pets that are normally kept outside, such as rabbits or guinea pigs. Close all of your windows and doors and try to drown

out the noise as much as possible. Make sure that cats and dogs have name tags on them in case the noise scares them and they run off. Do not let off fireworks near fields that contain horses or farm animals.

Callington RFC

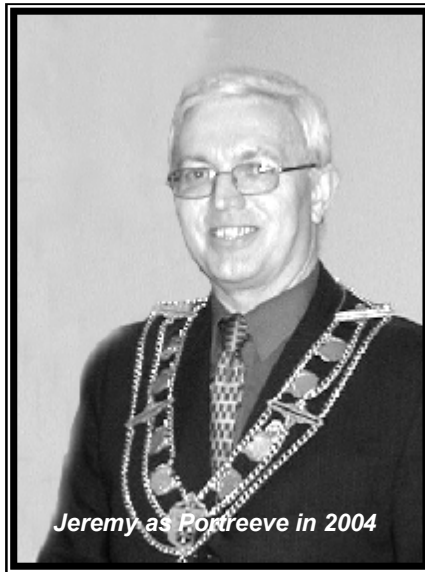

Motoring Matters – so does speeding

Continuing last month's subject, which was related to speed issues, here are some more details regarding excessive speed. Many of today's drivers do not think that the speed limits that are imposed upon us relate to them. This is a conception that some drivers have and is totally wrong. Speed restrictions are set for safety reasons and should be adhered to at all times. Ignoring speed limits can jeopardise you and some other person's life and also cost you a great deal of your hard earned cash in hefty

finer with penalty points on your licence. Here is another method of showing the differences in speed and the stopping distance. Car number 1 is travelling at 50 mph as car number 2 is overtaking at 65 mph. If, when the cars are side by side and an emergency stop is carried out, what speed will the faster car be doing when the slower car is already stopped? It is about 41.5. So at the point where the first car, moving at 50 mph, has stopped, the second car, originally travelling

at 65 mph, is still doing 41.5 mph. Makes you think, doesn't it? At slower speeds it is even more frightening. With the two cars doing 30 and 32 the speed of the faster car, when the slower is stopped, is still 11 mph. So a mere 2 mph over the 30 mph limit can cause more severe injuries to anyone that may be hit. Having a tonne of car hit you at 11 mph is somewhat frightening. Let us now look at the distance travelled at a given speed and how much time you could possibly save. At 60 mph

you are moving a mile every minute, which is approximately 88 feet per second. On your 10 mile journey at 60 mph this would take 6 minutes. Increasing your speed to 65 would save you 0.8 minutes which is 48 seconds. Conclusion: What is the point of speeding? You don't get there much quicker and you have a better chance of stopping if something happens in front of you. There are many other points that can be raised due to excessive speed but these can be covered in a later article.



New Tavistock Youth Venue

Tavistock youngsters recently celebrated their new facilities. 'Tavi Skate' a group of youths, parents and volunteers had raised a total of £41,000 for wheeled sports ramps. Adjacent to this the new Youth Café is opening, this will be open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Friday evenings for 11 to 18 year olds. It provides a kitchen, pool table, internet facilities and counselling services as well as a social area. The team leading the fund raising for this project which raised over £250,000 was led by the youth themselves.

The Town Council has met with County Highways to discuss town centre regeneration and next have a meeting with advisors about possible funding bodies. Initially a sum of around £20,000 is needed from grant funding to do a traffic management study, full consultation and make

recommendations. The Council is also looking at the feasibility of a Youth Café. *Lynda Small*

Are You a Good Parent?

ORDERS to be Read and Given to PARENTS on the Admittance of their CHILDREN into the Charity School. TO BE SET UP IN THEIR HOUSES.

I. That they submit their Children to the Trustees, to be ordered and governed at School, and put out Apprentices to such Employments, by Sea or Land, as they shall think proper.

II. That the parents constantly send their Children to School, clean wash'd and comb'd.

III. That they frequently call on their Children at home to repeat their Catechism, to read the Holy Scriptures, especially on the Lords Day, and to use Prayers Morning and Evening in their Families.

IV. That they be careful to give their Children Good Examples at home of a sober and religious Behaviour, of Humility, Contentment, and a ready Submission to the Duties of the Stations

wherein GOD shall Place them; to keep them in good Order, and correct them for such Faults as they commit out of School, or inform the Master or Mistress thereof.

V. That the Parents frequently inculcate on the Minds of their Children, the Principles of Loyalty and Obedience, and all good Affection to our most gracious Sovereign King GEORGE, and his Government.

VI. That they take care that their Children, on Days of publick Rejoicing, or Thanksgiving, do not use any Badges or Marks of Party-Distinction, nor go about Begging money for Bonfires; and that they do not on these, or any other Days, give opprobrious Language to any Person whomsoever.

VII. That they take Particular care not to suffer their Children to be seen with any Mob in a tumultuous Manner, upon any Occasion whatsoever; nor to join

those that play at Dice in Wheel-barrows, or at any other unlawful Games, in the Street, or elsewhere.

VIII. That the Parents shall freely submit their Children to be chastised for their Faults, and forebear coming to School on such Occasions, that the Master or Mistress may not be interrupted nor discouraged in the Performance of their Duty; but if they have any just occasion for Complaint, that it be made to the Trustees.
