Wednesday the 4th October is the 28th year of HONEY FAIR, an ancient Charter Fair which was re-established after many years in 1978. This was achieved by the efforts of local man John Trevithick. The first fair proved a huge success, however it was far too much work for one man, so the Lions Club of Callington were asked to take over the administration and organisation of the fair in 1979. The fair became established under the guidance of the late Wesley Wilton and has now evolved so much that two Car Parks and New Road are now used. Over 100 trade and charity stalls lined the street last year, and the fair has become one of the largest in Cornwall, and hundred's of people now visit this friendly and community based event each year.

A fun fair, and various street entertainers, (clowns, travelling musicians etc) add to the entertainment, also Town Crier's from the surrounding Towns are regular visitors.

This year to commemorate the 200th anniversary of

Isambard Kingdom Brunei the theme for the competitions is "Inventions and Innovations". This theme will be used for the Shop Window and Children's Art Competition. The Art Competition involves eleven Primary Schools in the district competing for the Challenge Shield and cash prizes. The subjects for this years competition will be connected to Isambard Kingdom Brunei. The entries will be displayed in the Town Hall Council Chamber on Honey Fair Day.

The Town Hall is also used for the central theme of the Fair, this is the Honey and Honey products competition and Honey sales etc. The Honey Show competition schedules and recipes are available from the Town Hall Callington. The local Community College will be providing musical items and the now famous Honey Cream Teas are being provided by the Lions Club Ladies and friends in the Town Hall.

In the Council Chamber the Liskeard Model Society will be staging an exhibition of models connected with the theme

of the day.

Honey Fair in Callington has always been a community event, and local charities and organisations participate and as always the churches are joining in with their exhibitions. Refreshments are available at St. Mary's Church and the Methodist Chapel. A Honey Fair Day Breakfast is available at the Social Club and the Callington Community Market will be open all day from 09.00-16.00hrs

To complete the day the Town Band will play in the Town Hall from 1900hrs. - 2000hrs. And then the church bells will ring for an hour.

Any monies received at Honey Fair are used for Lions charities throughout the year.

Admission to Honey Fair is free, also the large supervised Car Parking area in Saltash Road recreation field is free.

Liskeard Community Hospital - your local hospital

Some residents have only recently become aware that Liskeard Community Hospital can offer an alternative to travelling all the way to Derriford. Sarah Fisher of the North & East Cornwall Primary Care Trust kindly provided the following information.

The £7 million, Liskeard Community Hospital opened in January 2004 replacing the Lamellion and Passmore Edwards Hospitals and the Trewithan Health Office. The new facility provided the opportunity to improve services for patients, and has allowed the North and East Cornwall PCT to bring more services closer to where patients live.

The Hospital provides:

52 beds shared across the Oak (33) and Willow (19) Wards.

A Minor Injury Unit which is available seven days a week from 8 am to 10 pm. Minor Injury Units can treat a range of minor injuries for example, minor cuts/grazes and lacerations, sprains and strains, some broken bones (although these may need to be referred to an A&E Department), bites and stings, infected wounds, minor eye injuries and head injuries where there has been no loss of consciousness.

An x-ray facility which is available Monday to Friday between 9 am and 5 pm and half day sessions over the weekend on Saturday and Sunday.

Two dental consultation rooms where services are provided by the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Primary Care Trust Dental Service. This service enables residents and visitors to access pain relief, courses of treatment and special

care dentistry for those with particular needs.

35 out-patient clinics are available from the Hospital and include general surgery, audiology, diabetes, elder care rehabilitation, fracture clinics, rheumatology, respiratory medicine, plastics, ENT, colorectal, dermatology, paediatrics, gynaecology, urology, ophthalmology, ante-natal, palliative care and continence. There are plans to further increase the number of clinics available. Patients are referred into Liskeard Hospital via the Derriford Hospital Booking system alternatively, patients can request to be seen at Liskeard when they visit their GP and if appropriate will be allocated to Liskeard. This situation is currently under review and under Choose and Book scheme which is currently being implemented, patients will be able to select the clinic they would like to attend.

A Minor Surgery suite. Currently minor operations are undertaken for the specialties of Plastics, Podiatry and General Surgery. The possibility of expanding this is being explored. If you would like to be booked to attend Liskeard Hospital you should explore this with the consultant when you have your initial consultation.

In addition, the Hospital also boasts a £25,000 Audiology room – where staff can carry out hearing tests and a gym, which enables Physiotherapists to run specific exercise classes to help patients improve their mobility. The Hospital also accommodates Midwives, Health Visitors, Occupational Therapy, Specialist Nurses, District Nurses, Speech and Language Therapy, Family Planning Services, Podiatrists and, administration staff.

The Hospital is located on Clemo Road, Liskeard and can be contacted by telephoning 335600.



Free Courses for Patients Living with Chronic Illness

People living with a chronic illness such as Asthma, Arthritis, Diabetes, Epilepsy, Heart Failure, back pain and Multiple Sclerosis are being encouraged to sign up for free courses. The course consists of six 2 ½ hour sessions over six weeks. The course dates for Callington are 24 October - 28 November 2005

The Cornwall Expert Patient Programme works on the principle that those living with a long term

illness understand the consequences of living with this type of condition. The courses are run by qualified tutors are all graduates of the programme and have personal experience of chronic ill health.

Jane Jackson, Course Tutor said "Many people who live with a long term health condition – back pain, depression, diabetes and asthma for example do not identify themselves as having a chronic condition. The

courses are free and teach people to learn more about pain management techniques, coping with depression, relaxation, appropriate exercise, nutrition, dealing with fatigue, communicating with health professionals, and planning for the future."

A Report From Your Local Police

1. It has been brought to our attention by members of the community of a scam that will attempt to dupe people out of money. It involves letters being sent to addresses stating they have won a lottery and need to fill out personal details, name, bank details etc and return those details to them. This is an identity fraud scam and should somebody receive correspondence of this nature they need to inform Trading Standards or the Police.

2. The provision of additional officers in Callington [funded by the Town Council] continues to be a success. Police officers have patrolled Callington to target anti-social behaviour and disorder on weekend

evenings. The number of reported incidents has reduced and a visible police presence on the streets during these times has benefitted the town.

3. We still have suffered some youth related crime of late which is witnessed by the public but either not reported by them at all or later on the non emergency police number. We stress we need a 999 call if anybody sees crime being committed or someone perceives a situation needs urgent police response. Our control room will grade calls accordingly but we have a better chance of reducing crime and locating offenders if we are informed immediately an incident happens.

News from the Town Council

Well you win some and you loose some - grant applications that is. After recent successes we have just heard that we have not received the 2nd grant needed for CCTV. The Finance Committee now have to decide whether to put the extra sum needed onto your rates. As an average figure this would mean an extra £7 per household, per year on your rate for next year. Please let Councillors know what you feel about this.

The other application we have not had an initial success with was for the £200,000 needed to upgrade Launceston Road Recreation Field. This now means that the money

will have to come from several different sources and involves a great deal more time putting in grant applications. The next one we are waiting to hear from is the two grant applications for Lamorna Park. A grant application has also gone in for improved access in the Town Hall.

Thank you for all the letters of appreciation regarding the flowers in the town and the condition of the cemeteries. The work force continue to maintain the town despite being one man down and occasionally needing a holiday. We also thank everyone

offering to sponsor flowers for next year. As Anne Clements from J C Analytical Limited said "We are delighted to continue our sponsorship of a flower bed, Callington & Kelly Bray look lovely. Congratulations to the Council for their efforts in making Callington a more pleasant environment."

In compliance with Health & Safety regulations we are once again doing a memorial safety audit at the cemetery. If you find warning tape around a memorial you visit would you please contact the Town Clerk. In the interests of public safety warning tape should not be removed until unstability has been rectified.

School Diary

Continuing extracts from the Log Book for Callington Primary School.

1877. Many people seemed to have expected a decrease in the school fees and finding they are adhered to are now withdrawing their children. About twenty five children's names are struck off the register as 'left'.

1878. Children whose parents are too poor to pay fees are sent to school by the Relieving Officer. Fees to be paid by the Liskeard Board of Guardian.

Feb. 25th. and 26th. Gave licorice all around to stop the coughing.

1880. Typhoid is raging - fresh cases daily. School closed a week earlier than usual for the Christmas Holidays.

1882. A grandfather of one of our boys called to ask if his grandson

had been to school. The answer being in the negative, he seemed to think that a 'lock-up' was the only cure.

1883. The prevailing epidemic - Russian Influenza seems to have reached Callington.

1891 March 10th - school closed on account of the blizzard.

1893. July 6th. School closed on account of all the children having tea in the street to celebrate the Royal Wedding.

July 7th. As the children were very tired, very few came this morning, so we thought it best to close the school, until Monday.

Several families are leaving the town through the stoppage of the mines.

1898. Some time back the Attendance Officer obtained an order for the transference of a boy to the 'Truant School'.

1900. May 22nd. Holiday - by request of the inhabitants of

Callington - to celebrate the relief of Mafeking.

1902. April 11th. In consequence of a rumour of peace being declared (*Boer War*) Rev J.M.Milner called and gave the children half a day holiday. A telegram was later received from the News Office, Plymouth, which unfortunately proved the rumour to be unfounded.

June 2nd. Peace declared in South Africa - news reached here today - half day holiday given.

June 30th. In accordance with the King's wish the school will be closed for a week (Coronation week). June 30th to July 7th.

1904. June 1st. The first day of the running on G.W.R motor cars from Callington to Saltash and Albaston. The children ran excitedly after it through Fore Street when the first arrived.

Fair Trade for Callington

When asked by the editor to write a few lines about Fairtrade I realised how naive I had been in assuming that most people knew what it was all about. Why Fairtrade? What is Fairtrade? Fairtrade starts at home. Paying a fair price for goods, not too much or too little. Too much and we feel cheated and too little someone isn't getting a fair wage or their working conditions are dire.

Have you ever thought about where the food you eat comes from? Those of us who shop at Farmers or W.I.. Markets know the produce is local and fairly traded but what about our tea, coffee or chocolate? Who grows the tea, the coffee and cocoa beans? Are these farmers getting a fair price? The answer is YES – if you buy goods with the Fairtrade mark.

Let's take the cocoa bean, the main ingredient of chocolate, grown in Ghana, a country in West Africa where 1000s of villagers don't have easy access, if at all, to clean water. By buying

Fairtrade chocolate the cocoa farmer and his family

- receive a fair and steady price for their beans which means they can afford to send their children to primary school or to buy life saving medicines.
- and the Fairtrade cooperative in Ghana is able to invest money in village projects such as a well, a primary school or a small clinic.

Fairtrade is NOT about charity it is simply about fair trade. I shop, you shop, we all shop. So next time you are in a supermarket aisle see if you can spot the Fairtrade logo even better, give it a go!

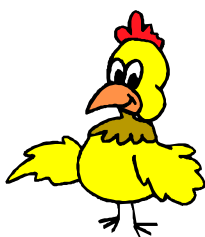
