Unitary Authority is an Opportunity for Callington

Irrespective of opinions on the decision to remove one level of government in Cornwall, Callington Town Council are determined to take the opportunity to attempt to bring as many services down to a local level as possible. We know that you, as resident, do not want to have to travel to St Austell to see a planning officer or have to communicate with someone in Truro who hasn't a clue where Kelly Bray is.

We have already been in communication with the 'One Cornwall' team and they have now realised, in their own words, "that no other town in Cornwall, with the exception of Truro provides as many services for their residents."

We have therefore invited the One Cornwall Team to

Callington to show them how important the delivery of local services is and to discuss the local control of more services. We believe the control of services should become more localised rather than receding to the distant offices of Truro. Even if Callington Town Council does not actually control the service there is no reason why we cannot host local offices for staff from the new council, so that you can have face-to-face contact with the people you need to see.

The original Unitary Authority bid put us in a large group with Saltash and Torpoint, but it is felt that we have little in common with those towns and also have far more experience at the provision of services than they have.

Unitary authority does mean that we can remove duplication of services and confusion about who does what. Theoretically it should provide economies and if we are proactive enough it can mean that the services you want can be controlled locally. This is a once-only opportunity and the challenge is in making certain that everyone gets it right.

Councillors would like to hear from you about which services you would like to see controlled from Callington and which you are happy to see controlled from Truro.

This is the biggest shake-up in local government for a very long time, so please help us by letting us know what you want.

Callington Becomes a Quality Council

Callington Town Council has become only the seventh council in Cornwall to achieve Quality Council status.

This government sponsored scheme sets a list of criteria to meet and Callington has met all but one of them for three

years. The last hurdle was surmounted when we had a contested election.

Apart from complying with all statutory requirements and having a qualified Clerk, the Council had to prove that it effectively communicated with its residents. Our Town Plan was considered an

excellent example of community participation and this newsletter, the Annual Report and public sessions at our meetings were some of the other examples.

Achieving Quality Council status will also assist us in our negotiations with the County Council.

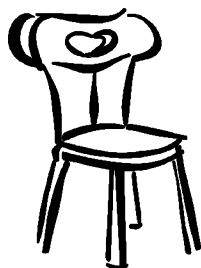

Tamar trekking options increase.

Work begins later this month to create a pedestrian underpass beneath the A390 Tavistock to Gunnislake road, at Gulworthy.

This major piece of engineering, costing around £600,000, is part of the Tamar Valley Mining Heritage Project, improving access to, and telling the story of, the area's rich mining heritage.

The underpass is a vital link in the 63km of new tracks and trails that are being created as part of the project. It will connect Devon Great Consols, once the largest copper mine in Europe, to the rest of the trail network, providing a safe crossing point for visitors.

Barry Gamble, Tamar Valley Mining Heritage Project Consultant, explains the importance of this piece of work, 'The underpass will

join up the old mineral railway, the course of which has remained wholly intact to this day. It was built between 1857-9 and paid for by the mine itself with permission from the Duke of Bedford. Bringing the tramway back into re-use in this sustainable way is meaningful conservation and enhances the authenticity and integrity of the whole system, particularly now that the area is part of the World Heritage Site.

Mr Gamble continues, 'A longer-term aim of the project is to open up the entire tramway from Morwellham to Devon Great Consols, enabling walkers and cyclists to enjoy an off-road route of 4 ½ miles'.

Traffic lights will control the flow of traffic at Gulworthy, from the middle of August. A new piece of temporary road will be put into place to direct

vehicles around the work site. The work, undertaken by a contractor, is expected to last around 4 months. The tracks and trails should be open for the public to enjoy early next year.

The works are part funded through the SW England Objective 2, European Funds, Devon Rural Renaissance, SWRDA, Devon County Council and West Devon Borough Council.

The Tamar Valley AONB team and West Devon Borough Council apologise for any disruption caused during the work. Caradon Befriending Scheme

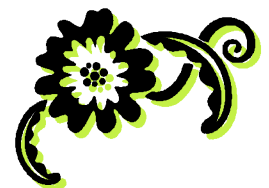

Eighty Years Ago

July 1927

A tender by the Callington and District Electric Company was accepted to provide electric lighting in the town [it had previously been lit with gas lamps]. The lights would go on at dusk and be switched off at 10.30.pm. At the meeting of the council it was resolved that the attention of the police be called to the youths and boys loitering around the new public lavatories at the Market gates, causing a great annoyance. There had been a fire at the fire station in Hays Road and the Fire Officer complained that the water pressure was so low they could not get water to the first floor window.

22nd September 1927.

A meeting of the Callington Urban District Council heard that the Medical Officer and Sanitary Inspector had issued Certificates of Occupation for the new dwellings in Greenbank Terrace. The estimate from the Callington Water Company to supply water to the houses for £12 per annum was accepted. There was also discussion about the management of the cattle market which was Council owned. *[This was on the site of Chyvarhas]*

There was also a lengthy debate about the pavements as the Council had now been informed by the Ministry of Health that the owners were no longer responsible for maintaining the sidewalks outside their properties in good repair. The Council therefore formed a Pavements Committee to look at the cost of repairs as "there had been many accidents and if something was not done soon, there would be many more".

Mr J Venning [Manager of the Unemployment Local Exchange] stated that the unemployment situation in Callington was very satisfactory, only four men being out of work. This was the smallest number on the records since the war.
