Gail sets off again, cycling for Women for Women

Gail Buttery brings us up to date with her exhausting efforts for charity.

"Last year I entered a new phase of my life when I started cycling to take part in a charity challenge. My original inspiration was Fern Britton cycling the banks of The Nile in aid of Women for Women. The charity raises funds for The Institute of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, whose Chairman is Professor Robert Winston. Its fundamental aim is to ensure more women have a normal pregnancy and healthy baby. Committing to do this meant I had to train throughout 2008; I completed over 1800 miles in preparation for the challenge in November. Fern also took part in Cycle Cuba, which was her third Women for Women challenge. She was a true inspiration, always smiling and was definitely one of the girls. The photo shows Fern and me celebrating at the finishing line. Many of you are aware that Fern used to live locally and knows Callington and its surrounding area very well. To any readers who were wondering how I managed in Cuba, I am delighted to report I cycled every one of the 400km and coped with the heat, bumpy roads and



many other hardships. Each difficulty was far outweighed by the wonderful experience of being part of a group of women, who had worked hard to make a difference.

The Cycle Cuba challenge raised in excess of £500,000. It just goes to show what can be achieved with enthusiasm and determination. I am still cycling, as I have remained committed to fund raising for this very worthwhile charity and in six weeks from the time of writing, I will be setting off to cycle across the Jordan Desert, from the Dead Sea to the Red Sea. This time there will be different conditions to experience. I'm not overly worried that there are 300km to be covered, or that there will be some difficult off-road terrain to contend with: my main concern

is the heat. I have no idea how I will cope with cycling in temperatures which could be as high as 40 degrees, followed by sub-zero nights. Of one thing I am certain: I will be among a band of like-minded, strong and determined women who won't give up!

In the meantime the fund raising continues. The next event will be lunch at Langmans Restaurant on Tuesday 15 September, when we will open from 11am-2pm to serve soup and rolls or delicious, freshly baked cakes. We even offer a take-away service for those in the centre of town who can't get away from work: just call 384933. There will be a second-hand book sale of cookery books, for those who may be interested in finding some new recipes.

Your say on your play

On Wednesday 11 August, thirteen children aged between 5 and 12 years old from Callington and Kelly Bray took part in a Children's Consultation Workshop.

The purpose of the workshop was to give these young people a chance to voice their opinions about Saltash Road Recreation Ground. Through talking, playing games and building models they were asked to say what they thought about the recreation ground i.e. what they like about it? what they don't like about it? and how would they like to change it?

Helen Miller, the event facilitator, said: 'Having thirteen children of all ages to attend a workshop like this is a fantastic achievement and Callington should be proud that so many youngsters have given up their time to attend and have their say.'

What next?

Further consultation is being carried out through a local competition that is open to all young people from any age up to 16 years of age. This is a drawing/art competition with three age categories:

7 years and under

8 to 11years

12 to 16 years

Winners from the each of the age categories will have their very own handprints and name put on new signage for the park. Those entering the competition that are 11 years or under will automatically be entered into a prize draw whereby the winner will help the Portreeve (Town Mayor, Rick Lumley) switch on the Christmas Lights on Saturday 5 December.

YOU SAY. . .



Joyce Lawrence writes: During the war I became a bus conductress with Western National. We booked on at 4.45am and the first bus out of Callington was 5.15am: the bus depot was in Valentine Row.

We took passengers to Saltash station to catch the motor that went to the dockyard. The fare to Saltash was 2/3d (about 11.5p nowadays) return.

When the bombs were falling over Plymouth, we had to pull in somewhere and put all the lights out until it was safe to carry on.

The back seat of the bus would be full. We collected mail bags from the Post Office, and carried flowers bound for Covent Garden.

Many people from Plymouth were evacuated to Callington and a lot stayed after the war.

Although I am now 84 years old, I still meet people I carried on those buses. I married my driver and my late son also drove buses for DAC. I am the only war-time bus conductress left in Callington - What stories to tell and what memories. . .

Festival Week programme

A couple of groups that got left out of the programme are:

The Friends of Callington & Gunnislake Health Centres (League of Friends) is a group of patients who raise funds for equipment for both Health Centres and the Community. The group meets once every two months at one of the Health Centres. It also aims to maintain good relations between patients and the practice, and invites comments, suggestions and criticisms about the practice. Posters in the reception areas of both Health Centres give further details.

The Friends paid £9000 toward the two new treatment rooms for minor operations in the Callington HC. The defibrillators at both Health Centres are becoming old and worn out (past their sell-by date). New automated defibrillators will be the next major purchase, so Friends are now actively raising funds.

Patients will also start to notice that the Callington

Health Centre will be more comfortable with the newly upgraded and refurbished waiting room, work that will be starting in another month or two. This is being paid for by the League of Friends.

Callington offers to help

The generosity of Callington people is well-recorded and *Gail Buttery* will be reporting on the work of local organisations for charities close to home in future articles: however, this month she has spent time with two Callington residents finding out how their efforts make a difference to people on other continents.

In 2003, Peter Sulston of Callington Art School, Church Street, was invited to organise a football tour for one-legged players from Sierra Leone. I didn't believe such a football match could take place, but I was wrong. With the exception of the goalie, each player has only one leg; the goalie had only one arm. One of the projects run by the charity Action for People in Conflict was working with children from Sierra Leone who had been deliberately mutilated by one or other of the factions to prevent the children fighting against them. Sad to say, there are a large number of children with only one leg. After organising the successful tour, which included matches in London and Liverpool, and a full FIFA-recognised International against the English one-legged football team, Peter became a Trustee of the charity.

The primary aim of Action for People in Conflict is to help those affected by war. This involves raising funds to finance various projects. In particular, helping refugees suffering psychological trauma as a direct result of being caught up in war zones - efforts were concentrated on helping children. Past projects have provided counselling for traumatised children arriving in the UK. Now efforts are focused on running a refuge for street children in Kenya. This provides a day centre, education, breakfast clubs and legal

services for up to 100 children at a time. These orphans receive support from local Kenyans in addition to funds raised in the UK. If you would like to find out more please contact Peter on 383491.

I am sure we can all remember the horrific scenes we witnessed through media coverage following the Tsunami of 2004. Often we are appalled at the time and then our attention is quickly diverted to another disaster and those people are forgotten. Thankfully that wasn't the case for a group of villagers in India and support has continued from Callington in the form of Tamwed. This is the result of a small group of caring and hard-working people; I met with two from the group, Jane Wetherby from Callington and Calstock resident, Oz Osborne.

Their common aim is a desire to help, on a long-term basis, communities in Southern India affected by the Tsunami. There is a group of eight committee members working with a wider group of 100 supporters. They arrange events, give talks, operate workshops, focusing on Indian issues such as Fair Trade and need for clean water. The soil was so contaminated with salt after the sea water receded that the traditional rice harvest cannot be grown. Many projects are linked to health needs; this has led to training community health workers and funding a homeopathic clinic and doctor. A major help for sanitation has been building toilets - compared with how much we may spend in the UK on a bathroom makeover, it costs just £30 to build a toilet. The communities are encouraged to be self sufficient; one excellent initiative has been providing the finances to train women to produce fabrics in a traditional way. Training in embroidery and tailoring equips them with additional skills to provide their own income.

Tamwed supports two areas in

South East India, in the state of Tamil Nadu. If, like me, geography of India is not your strong point then it may help to know that the capital Chennai, was formerly known as Madras. Collectively the two areas are the same size as Cornwall. They are rural areas; each has a population of 100,000. The people live here in absolute poverty, existing on well below the World Health Organisation standard of \$1 dollar per day. They are further marginalised within their own communities due to the caste system. It is important to know that every penny raised is accounted for by the local project manager and supporters from Callington visit to witness the projects. Their work is so important, as the aid agencies which arrived after the Tsunami have now left the area, leaving smaller organisations like Tamwed to maintain links with those affected.

Autumn entertainment starts this month

An exciting autumn season of live entertainment in the Town Hall marks a new era for Callington. The thinking behind the move is simple: after the tremendous success of the recent Festival Week many comments have been received on the idea of having entertainment within our town. Portreeve Richard Lumley recognises that not everyone can easily get to enjoy live shows that easily: "Not everyone has easy access to The Wharf in Tavistock or the cinemas or theatres in Plymouth. We have dipped our toe in the water with two visits by the BishBashBosh Theatre Company. The first one, 'The Tin Violin', was rated by Andy Frost as 'the best piece of visiting professional theatre in Callington for 20-odd years and the recent production of 'Surfing Tommies' received a standing ovation. It seems that the people of Callington are raring for an opportunity to see live acts here in town."

The season starts on Tuesday 22 September with a performance by Umdumo Wesizwe, an eight-piece group which hails from Zimbabwe's townships and was



established in 1994. Singing songs of love, hope, worship, courtship, hardship and African social commentary, the group has managed to carve a name for itself in the World music circuit.

The traditional music sung by Umdumo

Wesizwe was born in the mines of Southern Africa. Over the years they have shrugged barriers to create their own style of singing. This is *imbube* music that is laced with other music styles such as R 'n' B, Jazz, Kwaito and Reggae.

Umdumo has performed live music coupled with thought-provoking lyrics and well choreographed dances and movements to appreciative audiences at prestigious functions, venues and festivals across the UK.
